

A Peek into the Technology Lab

In the tech lab students are working on multiple skill sets in a given week. Middle School and High School students spend their days working on typing and increasing their accuracy and speed, while also working on passion-based-multimedia projects. Eventually we will be transitioning into coding, 3d printing, and other applications and projects.


Elementary School students are working on their mouse/keyboard skills, along with critical thinking and problem solving through various applications. Students will be working with peers and using manipulatives to build upon their fine motor skills.

The adult students come over for an internship where they are working on creating their news program "Turtle Talk", (in the green screen room) while shooting and editing their video segments.

Steps to Independence

This year in Joe's class, students will be working on different life skills in Steps to Independence. So far, students have completed lessons on straightening up a room (which focuses on motor planning and visual/spatial skills), wiping down tables and windows (sequencing and direction following), and dust mopping the floor! The class also works cross-curricular with Community Based Instruction, which had the students plan out a trip to Target where they budgeted for cleaning supplies. At Target, they shopped for the supplies and paid for them at the cash register thus working on independence. For Steps to Independence, students work on a structured format to ensure that the life skills being addressed are strengthened for an independent future. We are looking forward to a successful year!
